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### **Adult Education** during LENT \* 2024

We are reading "Rescuing the Bible from Fundamentalism: A Bishop Rethinks this Meaning of Script" by John Shelby Spong. This book was written 33 years ago. Spong writes in simple terms - allowing the readers to see things in a new light. It makes for a good discussion during our coffee hour. It brings spiritual conversation to the table and talk where people are in their faith journey. An insightful look at scripture in the context of history, culture and science. A thoughtful look at the Bible and the world today.

We went to Forward Movement to help us focus more on Jesus during Lent. First, we are glad to have this ministry of the Episcopal Church which grew out of the determination of the General Convention in 1934 to counter a period of anxiety, distrust, and decline in the Episcopal Church with a "forward movement" charged to "reinvigorate the life of the church.

Our first book from Forward Movement is "Dust Bunnies in the Basket", finding God in Lent and Easter by Episcopal priest Tim Schenck. It has questions at the end of each section which allow the readers to actually Think about their relationship with the Christ, and how they can improve that relationship. The priest reminds the Easter bunny that he is dust, not to discredit who he is and what he has to offer, but to remind him that we are all dust, yet welcomed and worthy.

The second from Forward Movement is the Lent Madness. A basketball-inspired holy competition to see which of 32 saints earns the coveted Golden Halo. While it all seems very frivolous, we'll learn about the saints along the way. By the time Holy Week comes along, we'll see how God works in the lives of ordinary people to shine the light of Christ's love in a world in need of hope. ## Notes from our Senior Warden


God hugs you.

#### From Rev. Theresa Kelley-Bergmann

The very first sentence, click on the blue, this will take you to a video ‰he Presiding Bishop Michael Curry invites you to explore Cursillo+. The resources are from the recently completed Episcopal Cursillo ministry conference held at Virginia Theological Seminary September 2023.

To the people without a computer, here is a little history and what Cursillo is:

The Episcopal Cursillo Ministry is an evolution of a Christian renewal movement which originated in Spain, and the Roman Catholic Church of the 1940s. The goal of Episcopal Cursillo is to help participants deepen their faith and strengthen their commitment to serving others.

Cursillo presumes that those who attend a Weekend are already well grounded in the faith. It is not intended to be a conversion experience, but an enriching and deepening of what is already there. It often provides new insights into our faith as well as fostering ministry among lay people.

In 2023, Bishop Marty shared her vision for bringing the Episcopal Cursillo program to the Diocese of Montana. She believes this program will help revitalize the faith of Episcopalians in the diocese, and create a community of committed Christian leaders who can serve the church and the world.

**To make her vision a reality, Bishop Marty empowered a leaders team**, known as a *Secretariat*, to begin work on bringing Episcopal Cursillo to the Diocese of Montana, by 2024. The Secretariat is responsible for planning and implementing Cursillo weekends. Cursillo Weekends are three-day retreats that include talks, group discussions, worship, and fellowship.

The Secretariat is also responsible for training and supporting the team of laypeople who will lead future Cursillo weekends. We had our first meeting February 10, 2024 in Helena. We had 26 people where we planned, sang, had lunch, and ended with Holy Eucharist. As you witness, I came back energized. **So** stay tune for the next phase.

Here's a really handy way to move our prayerful meditations forward...

Since 1935 millions of people have used Forward Day by Day as a way to spend dedicated time with Jesus, every single day. I recently realized that this is the same little booklet that my grandmother read every day when I was a kid.

Now, I read it every day myself. Many people talk about their time of prayer, meditation and reflection. I never could grasp that. However, when I discovered Forward Day by Day on the table in the Narthex a number of years ago, it was my "AHA moment".

I encourage you to pick up a copy and see what it's all about. Each day of the year has its own page. It begins with the date and what/who is honored that day. Then there is a bible passage, followed by the scriptures for the day.

Then it really gets interesting!

There are 3 authors every issue and their biographies are included. Each one has been assigned a month. They share their thoughts about the day's passage. At the bottom of the page is a Diocese to pray for. Every single one in the world gets their day. The last item is called "MOVING FORWARD": a suggestion for how you can incorporate the message into your own life.

That's a lot of information on one small page! It is very usable. So, *PLEASE* pick up a copy from the table in the Narthex. There are always copies left over, which is a shame because it is such a "handy" way to worship each day.
